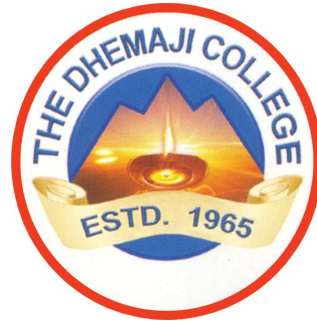

3. COMBINATION OF SUBJECTS

A. THREE YEAR DEGREE PROGRAMME (ARTS) :

- i. English is compulsory for all except for those with English Major.
- ii. MIL/Alt. English is compulsory for all. Among the Modern Indian Languages (MIL), facilities are available for Assamese only.
- iii. The students who are not interested in studying Major course, can select any two subjects as nonmajor course.
- iv. A Major course student has to select any one subject as General subject.
- v. A Paper on Environmental Studies is compulsory for 4th Semester students.

⊛ Under the Semester System, in 5th & 6th Semester of the Non-Major Programme (i.e. without having major course), there shall be two Skill-Based Courses in each of the 5th and 6th Semester.

B. THREE YEAR DEGREE PROGRAMME (SCIENCE) :

- i. English is compulsory.
- ii. The students who aren't interested in studying Major Course, the following course combinations are offered and they have to select any one of these combinations as non-major course:-

❖ **Chemistry Mathematics Physics**

❖ **Electronics Mathematics Physics**

❖ **Botany Chemistry Zoology**

- iii. A Major course student has to select any two of the above pass course subjects as general course.

- iv. A Paper on Environmental Studies is compulsory for 4th Semester students.

C. POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN COMPUTER APPLICATION (PGDCA):

Eligibility : Graduate

Course Duration : 1 (one) year.

D. CERTIFICATE COURSE IN COMPUTER APPLICATION :

Course Duration : 3 (Three) months, 6 (six) months and 1 (one) year.

4. ADMISSION PROCESS

(a) Application Forms for Admission :

Prescribed Application Forms for Admission to different programmes of study/ classes can be obtained along with the Prospectus at the cost of Rs. 200/- (Two Hundred) only each from the Admission Counter of the college. **The payment can be made at the Cash Counter, Dhemaji College in cash or by a bank draft drawn in favour of the Principal, Dhemaji College and payable at the State Bank of India, Dhemaji.**

The Application Form along with Prospectus can also be obtained by post. Request by post must be accompanied by a Self-addressed envelope of 25cm × 31cm size with postage stamp of Rs. 35/- (Thirty Five) only



along with a bank draft of Rs. 200/- (Two Hundred) only.

The Application Form for admission can also be downloaded from the Dhemaji College Website (www.dhemajicollege.in). The downloaded Application Form must be accompanied by a bank draft of Rs. 200/- (Two Hundred) only at the time of its submission.

Admission for other Programmes/Courses and its related information can be obtained from the Admission Counter of the college and the same will be notified in the College Notice Board from time to time. Moreover, students are advised to contact with the course coordinator of the respective programme in this regard.

For Hostel Admission, separate Hostel Admission Forms have to be obtained from the Admission Counter and the filled in Hostel Admission Form should be submitted at the time of admission.

b) Documents to be Attached with the Filled in Admission Form :

Attested copies of the following -

- (i) Marksheet and Certificate of the last qualifying examination.
- (ii) Age proof certificate.

- (iii) Caste certificate.
- (iv) Character certificate.
- (v) Two copies of recent passport size photograph signed by the candidate.
- (vi) Certificate of Co-curricular (Games & Sports, Cultural etc.) activities, Physically Challenges/ differently abled (in case of concerned reservation Quota)
- (vii) Students having the gap period in case of the last qualifying examination must submit a 'Gap Period Certificate' regarding the activities during the gap period with proper documents.
- (ix) Family Income certificate.

c) Admission in Major Course :

Candidates seeking admission in Major Course in different subjects have to apply separately to the Head of the Department concerned immediately after the admission in the College. They are advised to contact with the Department concerned in this regard. Selection of candidates in Major subjects will be on merit basis and as per College Rules. The related information in this regard is also notified in the Notice Boards by the Departments concerned.

d) Eligibility :

Eligibility for B.A. (Three year Degree Course) Programme/ Course :

- (i) Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination (Arts/Science/Commerce) with good academic record.
- (ii) For Major Course, Candidate should possess a good marks in aggregate as well as in the concerned subject in the H.S.(10+2) Final Examination.

Eligibility for B.Sc Programme/ Course:

- (i) Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination (Science) with good academic record.
- (ii) For Major Course, Candidate should possess a good marks in aggregate as well as in the concerned subject in the H.S.(10+2) Final Examination.

Eligibility for Post Graduate Diploma in Compute Application (PGDCA) Programme/ Course:

- (i) Graduate in any discipline with good academic record.

Eligibility for Certificate Course in Computer Application Programme/ Course:

- (i) H.S.L.C.(10th) /H.S.(10+2)/B.A./B.Sc. standard.

e) Reservation of Seats :

- (i) The College follows the policy of reservation of seats for students belonging to S.C./S.T.(P)/S.T.(H)/OBC/ MOBC as per Government Rules.
- (ii) Few seats are also reserved for the students having outstanding performances in the field of sports, culture, NCC and other co-curricular activities as per Government Rules.
- (iii) Moreover, reservation of seats is also applicable for differently abled/ physically challenged students.

These seats are allotted on the basis of merit-cum-proficiency in the concerned field and candidates seeking admission against reserved quota in sports, culture, NCC and other co-curricular activities have to submit attested copies of certificates regarding their proficiency in the concerned field along with Admission Form.

f) Hostel Admission :

The allotment of hostel (boys'/girls') to the selected candidate for Hostel Admission will be made immediately after the completion of Admission process. The selected candidates for Hostel accommodation shall have to pay the necessary hostel admission fee within the stipulated period of time as fixed by the College Authority, otherwise Hostel seat will be cancelled.

Hostel Rules :

1. The students should report personally to the Superintendent(s) of the Hostel for Hostel Admission.
 2. The boarders must maintain discipline and honest life style inside and out side of the Hostel.
 3. Boarders must abide by the Rules and Regulations of the Hostel prescribed by the College Authority, violation of which is subjected to disciplinary action including expulsion from the Hostel and College.
 4. Boarders must abide by all the rules and regulations of 'Dhemaji College Hostel Rules'.
- ❖ **The hostel admission will be reserved only for one academic year. The admission in the hostel in each academic year will be based on academic performance cum merit basis in Annual/Final Exams.**

5. GENERAL INFORMATION AND RULES

1. Great emphasis is laid on discipline and character building and students are expected to maintain a high standard of discipline. They are subjected to the Rules and Regulations of the College.
2. The students admitted to the college must abide by all Rules and Regulations as prescribed by the College Authority. Violation of rules, unsatisfactory progress, irregular attendance, showing discourtesy to the teachers and the staff members in any form, adopting unfair means during examination etc. are some of the offences which make students liable for disciplinary actions.
3. Regular attendance in class for all students is compulsory. Students must attend at least 75% of the total classes held, otherwise he/she will not be allowed to appear in the final examination.
4. Internal examinations like Unit Test, Terminal Examination, Test Examination etc. are compulsory for all students.
5. Attendance in the seminars/workshops/other academic as well as co-curricular activities organised by the department and college is compulsory for the students.
6. All the powers for maintenance of discipline are vested with the Principal and his decision shall be final in all such matters.
7. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited in the college.

6. ACCOMMODATION

The college provides accommodation facilities to the eligible students of the college. In this regard the college possess three Girls' Hostel and one Boys' Hostel within the college campus. The hostel seats are allotted on merit basis. Moreover, few seats are reserved for the students belonging from reserved categories. The accommodation facilities in detail are as follows :

9. REGISTRATION

The newly admitted Higher Secondary and Three Year Degree Course students have to be registered under Assam Higher Secondary Education Council (AHSEC) and Dibrugarh University (DU) respectively. Registration Form in this regard can be obtained from the Registration Branch of Dhemaji College and the students have to submit the filled in registration form to the Registration Branch of the college within the stipulated period of time as fixed by the College Authority.

10. EXAMINATION AND EXAMINATION RULES

Terminal / Test Examinations for all students are to be held as mentioned in the Academic Calendar. Moreover, students are required to appear in Unit Tests in different subjects conducted by the department concerned.

Students must appear in all of these examinations and secure a minimum qualifying mark. Any student who fails to fulfil this condition will not be allowed to appear in the final examination of Board / University.

Date of Final Examination of Board/University will be notified by the AHSEC/DU respectively.

Promotion to next higher class as well as allowing a student to appear in the final examination conducted by AHSEC/DU are governed by College/AHSEC/DU Rules

11. IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING REGULATIONS FOR THE STUDENTS OF B.A./ B.SC. PROGRAMMES UNDER THE RULES OF SEMESTER SYSTEM OF DIBRUGARH UNIVERSITY.

- ❑ Semester Classification : Odd Semesters - 1st, 3rd and 5th Semesters
Even Semesters - 2nd, 4th and 6th Semesters.
- ❑ Examination and Evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis.
- ❑ In internal assessment different tools will be used such as written tests, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work etc. suitable to the courses.
- ❑ The students will be informed in advance about the nature of internal assessment. Attendance in internal assessment is compulsory, failing which the student will not be allowed to appear in the End Semester Examination.
- ❑ A student can not repeat In-Semester Examinations. However, if student fails to appear in any one of the In-Semester Examinations on valid reasons, the department concerned may arrange special In-Semester Examination whenever necessary.
- ❑ At least 40% marks in the course of the End Semester Examinations is necessary.
- ❑ At least 40% marks in the course in aggregate in the In-Semester and End Semester Examinations is required.
- ❑ If a candidate clears the 6th Semester Examination before clearing all the courses of the previous Semesters, the result of the 6th Semester Examination of that candidate shall be kept withheld and his/her results shall be announced only after he/she clears the courses of the previous semesters.
- ❑ A candidate shall be entitled to a maximum of three consecutive chances to clear a course.
- ❑ A candidate may be allowed for college transfer only once during the whole programme.

STRUCTURE OF COURSES OF THE PROGRAMMES :

The term 'Under Graduate programme' is used to denote B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. Programmes offered by Dibrugarh University. All B.A., B.Sc., B. Com. Programmes shall have the following components, viz.

- (i) Compulsory Courses : These courses are the compulsory courses for all students of the programme concerned.
- (ii) Major Courses : Major courses shall be chosen by the students. The Courses shall be optional and non-mandatory.
- (iii) Non-Major Courses : Non-Major courses shall be chosen by the students, who do not opt for major courses.
- (iv) Skill-based Courses : A vocational course shall be mandatory for all non-major students. The colleges shall offer the Skill-based Courses as per their own infrastructure and human resource feasibility.

Attendance:

(i) A student who has less than 85% attendance shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination in the course in which the short-fall exists. Provided that it shall be open to the University to grant exemption to a student who has attended a minimum of 75% classes but failed to obtain the prescribed 85% attendance for valid reasons on recommendation of the Head/Director/ Coordinator of the Department/ Centre on payment of a prescribed fee(s).

The Principal of the college with recommendation of the Heads of the Departments shall announce the names of all students who shall not be eligible to appear in the Endsemester examinations in the various courses due to less attendance and send a copy of the same to the University. Registrations of such students may be treated as cancelled by the University.

Examination and Evaluation:

- (a) Examination and evaluation shall be done on a continuous basis, at least three times during each semester.
- (b) There shall be 25% marks for internal assessment and 75% marks for Endsemester examination in each course during every semester.
- (c) **Internal Assessment :**
 - (i) In internal assessment, different tools may be employed one or more assessment tools such as objective tests, written tests, assignments, paper presentation, laboratory work, etc. suitable to the courses.
 - (ii) The students shall be informed in advance about the nature of assessment. Students shall compulsorily attend internal assessment, failing which they will not be allowed to appear for the End-semester examination. A Student cannot repeat In-semester examinations. The department may arrange special insemester examination whenever necessary.
- (d) **End Semester Examination:**
 - (i) There shall be one End semester examination carrying 75% Marks in each course of a Semester covering the entire syllabus prescribed for the course. The End semester examination is normally a written/ laboratory-based examination/Project Work/Dissertation.
 - (ii) The Controller of Examination shall then make necessary arrangements for notifying the dates of the end semester examinations and other procedures as per Dibrugarh University Rules (at least 20 days in advance) and the Academic Calendar notified by the University.
 - (iii) Normally, the end –semester examination for each course shall be of three hour duration.
- (e) Setting of question papers, moderation of question papers, evaluation of answer scripts, scrutiny, tabulation of marks, etc. and announce-





ment of results, shall be governed by the Dibrugarh University Examination Ordinance 1972 (as amended upto date).

(f) Practical Examination:

Practical Examinations of a Semester shall normally be held prior to the End Semester Examinations.

(g) Betterment Examination:

(i) A student shall be entitled to take the “betterment examinations” in any two theory courses of one semester after passing the Sixth Semester examination only once. In this case, he/she shall have to surrender the concerned earlier mark-sheet to the Controller of Examinations. The higher marks secured by the student shall be retained. The candidates shall have to apply for betterment examination within one year of passing the Sixth Semester examination.

(ii) No betterment shall be allowed in the practical examinations.

Results and Progression:

(a) A candidate, shall be declared as passed a course, provided he/she secures-

- (i) at least 40% marks in each course in the end semester examinations
- (ii) at least 40% marks in each course in aggregate in the in-semester and endsemester examinations.

(b) A candidate shall be declared as passed a semester, provided he/ she passes all the courses of a semester.

(c) The marks of in-semester examinations obtained by the candidate shall be carried over for declaring any result.

(d) A student, who could not appear or failed or has backlogs in any semester examination, shall be allowed to clear the same in the following manner:

(i) The First semester examination with the next Third semester examination.

(ii) The Second Semester examination with the next Fourth Semester examination.

(iii) The Third Semester examination with the next Fifth Semester examination.

(iv) The Fourth Semester examination with the next Sixth Semester examination.

(v) The Fifth and the Sixth Semester examinations with the next corresponding semester examinations.

(e) A student must pass all his/her semester examinations within 6 years from the date of admission to the First Semester Course. A student, who could not appear or have been failed in an End- Semester examination, shall have to clear the absent or failed paper(s) as backlog in the next corresponding examinations.

(f) A student shall not be entitled to more than two chances in general to clear a particular semester, provided that a student may avail a special third chance to clear a particular semester once in the whole course. Provided that the total number of chances to clear all the four semesters shall not exceed thirteen.

(g) Since the Semester system involves continuous assessment, there shall be no scope for a student to appear as a private candidate in any subject in this system.

(h) A student who fails to appear in an end-semester examination for valid reasons supported by proofs; or fails in the aggregate even though he passes in all the papers individually; or fails in not more than two papers while he passes in the aggregate or fails in more than two papers as well as the aggregate shall be allowed to continue in the succeeding semester in the following manner:

(i) after the First Semester in the Second Semester,

(ii) after the Second Semester in the Third Semester provided he/she passes the First Semester or clears the backlogs of the First Semester as provided in clause 8(d);

- (iii) after the Third in the Fourth Semester provided he/she passes the Second semester or clears the backlogs of the Second Semester as provided in clause 8(d);
- (iv) after the Fourth in the Fifth Semester provided he/she passes the Third semester or clears the backlogs of the Third Semester as provided in clause 8(d);
- (v) after the Fifth in the Sixth Semester provided he/she passes the Fourth semester or clears the backlogs of the Fourth Semester as provided in clause 8(d);
- (i) A candidate shall be declared to have passed the Three Year Degree B.A./B.Sc./B.Comm programme provided he/she has passed all the Semesters and in all the Courses separately.
- (j) The degrees shall be offered to each candidate, who has passed the Three Year Degree B.A./B.Sc./ B.Comm programme in the following manner:

60% and above marks in aggregate	First Class	60% and above marks in major course in aggregate	First Class
50% and above but less than 60% marks in aggregate	2nd Class	50% and above but less than 60% marks in major courses in aggregate	2nd Class

- ⊗ A student, who secures 60% and above marks in all the courses individually in all the semesters shall be declared have passed with first division (in case of the students pursuing General programmes) with distinction or first class (in case of the students pursuing Major/ speciality programmes) with distinction.

PROCEDURE FOR IN –SEMESTER EVALUATION:

- i. The marks allotted for in-semester evaluation (20%) in each course shall be based on the following:
 - (a) Sessional Examination I (Written)
 - (b) Sessional Examination-II (Written)
 - (c) Attendance
 - (d) Home assignments, Seminars, Group Discussion, etc.
 Home assignments may be given to the students at any time during the semester. The total internal marks in (a) to (d) would be 20% of the total marks allotted to the paper.
- ii. Each sessional examination shall be of one hour duration and be conducted by the concerned teacher(s) of the course. The setting of question paper, invigilation duty, evaluation of answerscripts for each paper shall be done by the concerned teacher(s) as a part of his/her/their normal duty. The teacher concerned shall fix the date of the sessional examination in each course following the guidelines given in Annexure- I. The students shall write the answers in proper University answer books.
- iii. After evaluation, the answer scripts should be shown to the students and corrections should be made if necessary. After this the answerscripts should be collected back from the students. The entire process of conducting the In-Semester Examination should be mentioned in the Academic Calendar.
- iv. There shall be no provision for “repeat”/ “betterment” in the sessional examination. If a student misses any sessional examination for unavoidable reasons, then the concerned teacher may allow the student a separate examination at his/her own discretion.
- v. There shall be no provision for “repeat”/ “betterment” in internal assessment. The marks of internal assessment secured by a candidate shall be carried over to next legitimate chances.
- vi. If a course is taught by more than one teacher then the concerned teachers shall cooperate in conducting the internal evaluation. Each sessional examination for a particular paper shall be of one hour duration even if it is taught by more than one teachers.
- vii. At the end of the semester (before the end-semester examinations begin) the concerned College shall submit the in-semester marks in proper mark sheets along with the answer scripts to the University.

To adjust with the recent trend of different competitive and service entry examinations, the College has introduced a separate Cell in the College Library from the Academic session 2009-10 under the assistance of the UGC. The Cell contains almost all supporting books and other related documents on different competitive and service entry examinations. It is an opportunity to have such valuable materials and information in a College Library on modern trend of competitive and service entry examinations and therefore taking the full advantage of it from the part of the student community is one of the main expectations of Dhemaji College.

LIBRARY, CECDC :

Apart from the Central Library, Dhemaji College offers another provision of library services at CECDC, Dhemaji College. Another Automatic Weather Station is installed by the college which is sponsored by Department of Science and Technology, Govt. of Assam and ASTEC, Guwahati.

24. LEGAL AWARENESS CELL/ CLUB, DHEMAJI COLLEGE

The college has formed a Legal Awareness Club with active corporation form District Sessions Judges Court and District Legal Cell. The aim of the Cell is to provide necessary information to acquire the help from Legal Services of the Govt. as well as to make a close link between the Legal service department of Govt. and the common people from different weaker sections of the society with an aim to contribute towards social peace and development.

Dhemaji College has a separate building for Sericulture with well equipped laboratory and other required facilities which was developed under the UGC sponsored schemes. “**CHUMONI**” and “**NONI BARI**” - the food plants garden for non-mulberry and mulberry are the special feature of it. These are located within the campus of **RACHMEE**, Dhemaji College.
